Due to our volunteer marchers, decorators, musicians, door monitors, kitchen/bar staff, servers, we had another successful year of celebrations. Lastly, I would like to update you on some improvement initiatives the BOD have been working on this Winter. The Board approved a new card access system from Associated Alarms which is being installed as we speak. The new system is an internet based security monitoring system which will streamline the cumbersome process of adding and/or renewing membership access and security monitoring. Susan Christiansen can provide more details but it will be a huge improvement for the Club going forward.

We are also looking at a "Point of Sale (POS) software system" for our registers in the bar/food service areas to assist with streamlining cash reconciliation, provide up-to-date inventory tracking and point-of-sale control reporting. Utilizing the latest technology with these two initiatives will help decrease the ongoing day-to-day challenges our BOD and Bar/Kitchen Managers face in order to run our club efficiently and provide much improved inventory control management for the Club.

I'd also like to share some thoughts as we look forward to SPRING and rejuvenation at the Club. The BOD have met frequently the last couple of months to discuss opportunities to improve membership satisfaction. I'd like to invite **all** of our members into this discussion. We often times assume what members would like or provide anecdotal suggestions with little or no feedback from our most important participants – OUR MEMBERS. We would like to encourage more attendance at our monthly membership meeting so we can begin to have an open dialogue as to how we can work together to improve membership communication in a more **positive** way. 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## Club Member Spotlight

Each month we spotlight a Club member. This month, we introduce you to The Irish Woman and Man of the Year: Sue Loughlin and John Flaherty:



**Sue Loughlin** became involved in the SOECC right at the beginning. It was geographically easy for her to get involved: the old Club building was right in her back yard. She is a frequent customer of SOECC, as that is the best way to get to know members of the community. An important part of her involvement has been volunteering to help with Club events. She has led the decorating efforts at each holiday, and has also been a member of the Events Committee.

Sue's decorating expertise comes from her long business experience in her family's florist shop in Newton. With her mother and sisters, Sue ran the shop for 25 years, until it was sold. Her two sons still live in Newton. While Sue bought her house on the Cape in 1999, she became a permanent resident six years ago. Since that time, she has increased her involvement with the Club and with the Irish Village.

Sue very much appreciated the honor of being selected as Irish Woman of the Year. While she felt that she did not need the title, she thinks that the honor is important for the community. She found her participation in the parade to be cold, but fun. Typically, she has marched in the parade; this year, she enjoyed riding in a car and waving at the spectators. Sue's Irish heritage is through her McCarron grandparents, while her father was of Scottish ancestry.



One of the things that Sue appreciates most about the SOECCC is the equality of membership for men and woman. It's important to her that the Club is not a men's Club with women as auxiliary members, as so often happens in other organizations. She encourages members to get involved by finding the volunteer tasks which match their interests.

Her buddy, who joined us at the end of the interview, described Sue as a "good friend, who would do anything for you." That aptly summarizes her involvement in the Club. What better description can there be for someone so deserving of the honor, Irish Woman of the Year?"



**John Flaherty** considers it a great honor to be associated with past winners of the Irish Man of the Year award, the men who founded the SOECC and who have worked so hard to make it the best Club on Cape Cod. These are the men who deserve all the credit for making the Club what it is today: Mike Shea, Big Mike Nicklaw, Gus Healy, Bob Bagge, Paul Bridgeo, Mike Regan, Ed Tierney, Papa Jim Washburn, Dennis Leary, and Ollie Kelley and now, he can humbly add his name.

In the six years as Membership Secretary, he created a system for cataloguing Club member information and managed the key card and chip systems. He interviewed hundreds of people who applied to be members and then saw them enjoy the many benefits of being a member. He served two years on the Board of Directors and filled in as the de facto Sergeant of Arms when the position was vacated. He has monitored the doors on St Patrick Parade Day, sold 50/50 tickets, and attended many of the social functions.



He proudly watched his family and friends cheer for him as he rode in Faith Hickey's Mercedes convertible down Route 28. It was the recognition for all the hard work that was put into the Membership position.

He is very proud of his Irish heritage. He has received his Irish citizenship. His family is everything to him; growing up in South Boston with his grandparents. On St. Patrick's Parade Day, all family members, no matter how distant, were welcomed by his grandparents into their home and served a corn beef sandwich or Shepherd's pie. The Irish culture and the values that are instilled in all Irishmen is what makes being Irish special.



He reminds us that the SOECC is our Club. It is not his Club, it is not the Founders Club, it is not the Board of Directors Club but it is the Club of every member of the Sons of Erin CC. He knows we are all busy, but to volunteer a couple of hours per year to the Club for things such Spring and Fall cleanups, decorating the Club for special events, covering the door on special days, helping Katie in the kitchen prepare meals, would be so beneficial and helpful. To members aged 50 and under, he has a special appeal: five to 10 years from now, most of the Board Members and the small group of volunteers who keep the Club going may not be able to physically do what they do today. It is up to you to step up and keep the Club going and to make the Sons of Erin CC even better than it is today.

## SOECC Scholarships

Eligibility: All applicants must be the child, step-child, grandchild or step-grandchild of an active member of the SOECC. Applicants must be attending or be going to attend a 2 or 4 year college or 4 year university or some secondary work/study program that is comparable. Applications are available on the website and at the Club.

The full application is due by May 15th, 2017. Any applications received after May 15th, 2017 will not be reviewed. Scholarship recipients will be notified by the Scholarship Chair in June 2017 and announced in the newsletter. Awards shall take place at our June or July membership meeting.

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## Culture Corner

### Tracing Your Irish Roots

There are 35 million people in the United States who embrace Irish ancestry. New services like [23andMe](http://23andMe.com) and [Ancestry.com](http://Ancestry.com) have made finding out about your genetic heritage quite popular. You don't need to use one of these expensive businesses to research your Irish heritage. According to the website, [Ireland.com](http://Ireland.com), there are increasing numbers of resources available, both online and from official organizations, to assist you in finding out about your Irish ancestry. These include:

1. The National Archives, which offers a free, short, personal consultation with professional genealogists.
2. The General Register Office registers all civil birth, adoption, death, marriage and civil partnerships in the Republic of Ireland. You can get copies of records at its Dublin office or online.
3. The National Library has a free walk-in advisory service, varied workshops and talks. It also has microfilm copies of most surviving Roman Catholic parish registers.
4. The Ireland Family History on Facebook page has regular Q & A sessions with genealogy experts.
5. County Genealogy Centers in many of Ireland's counties work with volunteers, local historical societies, local clergy and authorities, government agencies and libraries to build a database of genealogical records.
6. IrishGenealogy.ie is run by the Irish government and brings together church and civil records in one online, searchable and free archive.

Other sources are the Public Record Office of Northern Ireland, the Ulster Historical Foundation, the Glasnevin Cemetery Museum, and Military Archives. The Yarmouth Town Library has a Genealogy Club, which meets on the second Thursday of each month at 6:30 pm at the South Yarmouth Library. Some meetings feature guest speakers, and others are hands-on work sessions. For more information, contact Jane Cain, Library Director.
